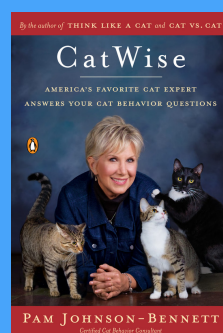
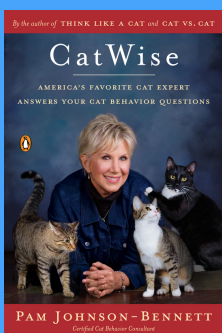

## INTERACTIVE PLAYTIME QUICK TIPS



### IT'S MORE THAN JUST SIMPLE PLAYTIME

#### Interactive Playtime has Many Benefits

This type of play is great for trust-building, strengthening the bond you share, helping a shy cat to blossom, diffusing potential aggression, exercise, stress-relief, boredom-busting and so much more.



### USE THE RIGHT TOY

#### Interactive Toys

The basic design of an interactive toy is based on a simple fishing pole. This way, YOU can control the movement, speed and direction. When you move the toy like prey, it'll stimulate the hunter in your cat. Interactive toys also put a safe distance between your cat's teeth and your fingers.



### USE THE RIGHT TECHNIQUE

#### Think Like Prey

Move the toy across or away from your cat's visual field. Don't dangle it in front of your cat. Prey doesn't willingly offer itself up for lunch. Move the toy the way prey would move so your cat can stalk, plan and pounce. Make sure your cat gets plenty of captures during the game. At the end of the game, wind the action down so the "prey" dies and the cat is left satisfied. Don't end games abruptly.



### PLAY EVERY DAY

#### Be Consistent

Schedule at least two fifteen-minute sessions a day. It will most likely be the best part of your cat's day. The daily play sessions may go a long way in helping avoid behavior problems and boredom. Just be sure you put the interactive toys away after each session to avoid the risk of choking or strangulation. Never leave stringed toys out for solo play.



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
